Keynote Presenters

Nicole Senior

Nicole Senior is an Accredited Nutritionist, nutrition writer, speaker and consultant. She completed her dietetic training at the University of Wollongong and went on to complete graduate diplomas in marketing and PR from the University of NSW and the University of Technology in Sydney. She is author of two heart-healthy recipe books: *Eat to Beat Cholesterol* (plus a website of the same name) and *Heart Food*, and is Nutrition Editor for *Super Food Ideas* magazine. She provides nutrition expertise, advice, ideas and communication savvy to a range of food industry and community clients. Nicole has a keen interest in environment issues and convenes the DAA Food and Environment Interest Group. She is a nutrition commentator in the media, and more recently has embraced Twitter and Facebook to spread the good word on nutrition to the bold new world online.

Dr Maree Ferguson

Dr Maree Ferguson is Director, Nutrition and Dietetics at Princess Alexandra Hospital. Maree completed her PhD at Queensland University of Technology and developed the Malnutrition Screening Tool (MST) to identify patients at risk of malnutrition on hospital admission. She is internationally renowned as a leader in nutrition screening, having published and presented extensively on this topic in international forums. Her innovative MST has been implemented in many hospitals worldwide. Maree received the DAA President's Award for Innovation in 2009 for her work on the MST.

Maree is a keen researcher and is an associate investigator on a 2010 NHMRC grant. Maree was the Chair of the American Dietetic Association (ADA) Evidence Analysis Library committee on nutrition screening. She is also a member of the Dietitians Association of Australia (DAA) committee for the development of evidence-based guidelines for the nutritional management of malnutrition. Maree has more than 20 peer-reviewed publications. She is a reviewer for the *Journal of the American Dietetic Association*, *European Journal of Clinical Nutrition*, and *Nutrition and Dietetics*.



Keynote Presenters

Annette Byron

Annette Byron entered the profession in 1983 with a postgraduate Diploma in Nutrition and Dietetics from Flinders University. During her career she has had a number of roles including clinician, educator, and manager in rural and remote areas and major metropolitan hospitals in four Australian States and Territories. She has worked in the public and private health sectors providing services to adults and children, and also in the tertiary education sector. Postgraduate studies have included an upgrade of her nutrition qualifications, a Master of Business Administration and a Master of Public Health. Annette has been an active participant in DAA committees at branch and national level, and was Vice President in 2003-2004. She joined the staff at DAA in 2007 as Policy Dietitian before taking on the role of Professional Services Manager in 2009. As Professional Services Manager with the DAA, Annette manages the Professional Services Unit and is a member of the organisation's executive team. Her role involves the management of the APD program and a large range of other professional services.

Dr Rosemary Stanton OAM

Dr Rosemary Stanton is a nutritionist whose work over the last 45 years has involved public health nutrition, education and consumer issues relating to nutrition. She is a Visiting Fellow in the School of Medical Sciences at the University of New South Wales, is involved with the Institute for Sustainable Futures at the University of Technology (Sydney) in their international work on sustainable use of resources in food production. As well as many scientific papers, Rosemary has authored over 30 books on food and nutrition and writes for newspapers and magazines for the public and the medical profession. Her current interests focus on the interrelationships between healthy diets and environmental factors.

Unique to the NCP is the use of the standardised language of dietetics, which will simplify documentation and provide a common understanding of the work that dietitians do.
